THE HIGHLIGHTS:

- Extended school choice scholarship eligibility to every K-12 student in FL while also converting one-time vouchers to flexible-use Education Savings Accounts (ESAs). **HB1**
- Protected 500,000 public employees by ensuring that they are not coerced into joining a union, that bargaining units are providing value to employees, and taxpayer dollars are not used to collect dues for unions. **SB256**
- Reformed civil litigation rules that had created a cottage industry of frivolous and fraudulent lawsuits, costing taxpayers thousands of dollars every year in an unnecessary "tort tax." HB837

- Cut off ESG scoring within the \$202 billion in Florida's retirement plan, ensuring the 2.6 million participants are protected from "woke investing" practices that do not put returns first. **HB3**
- Mandated that Florida's 2.8 million public school children learn how to stay safe online. HB379
- Passed legislation to connect 900,000 Floridians to high-speed internet. **HB1221**
- Ensured mobile applications domiciled in hostile nations are not on government devices. **SB258**

- Banned the preemptive establishment of any Central Bank Digital Currency in the state.

- Authorized students applying for Bright Futures scholarships to be able to submit test scores from a new college entrance exam the Classic Learning Test (CLT) that rivals the SAT and ACT.

HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED:

- Prevented compelled speech on state university campuses (specifically, "diversity statements" political litmus tests for student admissions and/or faculty hiring/promotion). **HB931**
- Replaced mandatory college courses in "diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI)" with general education requirements from core academic disciplines. **SB266**
- Strengthened viewpoint diversity on college campuses via enhanced speaker programs and academic centers named for Alexander Hamilton, Adam Smith, etc.

HB931

- Allowed charter schools to receive a portion of the local monies collected to fund school buildings/facilities.
- Expanded Telemedicine availability for every Floridian.
- **HB279**
- Protected the freedom of physicians in Florida from mandates on conducting specific procedures that violate their religious beliefs. **SB1580**
- Established a mechanism for small businesses to seek redress from the overreach of local government, through statewide preemption and business impact statements on local ordinances.

SB170

- Continued to protect the integrity and security of Florida's election system. **SB7050**
- Preempted local governments from forcing Florida's 2.8 million small businesses to pay specific wage amounts greater than the established minimum wage.

SB892

- Preempted municipalities from banning drone delivery services. **SB1068**
- Passed a budget of \$117 billion, in line with JMI's "Conservative Florida Budget" principle, keeping expenditures at or below the combined rate of population growth plus inflation.
